QUESTIONS FOR LEADERS

1. What comes to mind when you think of what it means to be a worship leader?

2. What lies have you been believing about what success looks like for a worship leader?

3. What statement in this chapter surprised you? Why? Do you agree with it now?

1. What steps do you take to nourish a healthy private life of worship?

2. What are the hindrances to you spending time with Jesus in private worship daily? What will you do about this?

WE ARE WORSHIPERS

3. Have you ever sung to God in private, where "there is no one . . . to applaud [you], no one to cheer [you] on or tell [you you] are great"? If you have, how did you feel? If you have not, why not?

4. When we don't feel like worshiping God, we should remind ourselves of His many noble qualities, says the author, including His goodness, His unchanging nature (or *immutability*), His truthfulness, His love, His justice, His purity, and His excellence. Which of these do you most appreciate in your Father? Spend time meditating on that quality and thank Him for it.

1. In what ways are you attempting to create an identity for yourself?

2. What about yourself do you think is most important? What do you lead with when you introduce yourself? What do you want everyone to know about you?

3. As believers, you and I are commended by, loved by, and adopted by God. Can you think of anything you have done or any logical reason why God would do this?

4. How does the fact God has adopted you impact the way you view God and yourself?

1. "A worship leader is not just a singer or musician or artist. He is a pastor or deacon, and watchman over God's church. He is a teacher of doctrine." Do you agree with these statements that as a worship leader you have a pastoral or diaconal role, and that you are to guard the purity of the church and teach doctrine as opportunities arise? Why or why not?

2. Do you meet the qualifications of a pastor or deacon found in Scripture? If not, what will you do about it?

3. What ways are you intentionally shepherding and pastoring people in your worship leading?

QUESTIONS FOR LEADERS

1. What hesitations would you have to changing the structure of your service to a more formal or historic liturgy?

2. What songs do you have in your corporate worship music repertoire that most effectively communicate the story of the gospel individually? How can you order those to tell the story most effectively and collectively in a service?

3. How often in a typical worship service do you include hymns or worship songs that either quote or reference Bible truths about the gospel or God's redemptive plan through Jesus, His Son?

 In what ways have you, as a worship leader, felt society's pressure to present a "dulled-down, comfortable worship"? Have you ever succumbed to that cultural pressure in choosing (or not choosing) certain music?

2. Do you have any hesitations about evangelism? What are they? How will you overcome that?

3. Do you believe God can use your leadership and songs to save people? Do you believe He wants to?

1. How much time do you spend each week on creativity?

2. "Art is a wonderful servant, but a terrible master." In what ways can artistic elements in the worship service threaten to overwhelm the purpose of worship—to bring glory to Jesus Christ? Has this ever happened in your church? If so, explain what occurred.

3. What creative elements have you or members of your worship team considered in the past? Were any adopted? If so, how did they work?

4. How do you define excellence in art and music? Do you believe that excellence is somehow less spiritual? If so, why? Is that biblical?
